320-million-year-old shark tooth fossil discovered

Geopark Geologist Dr. Eamon Doyle made a rare and significant discovery on the Geopark coastline when he found a shark tooth fossil. The tooth belonged to a shark that once hunted during the Carboniferous period in the waters off Ireland at a time when the country was located close to the equator.

Dr Eamon Doyle said: "Fossil sharks teeth of this age are very rare in Ireland and so it extends the known range of fossil sharks in Ireland. Equally significant is the information it gives us about the biodiversity of these ancient seas."



The fossil will be placed on public display on Thursday 25th May at an event, entitled 'There's Life in

the Old Rocks of Clare', in Ennistymon Public Library at 11.30am.

The Burren Rocks again!

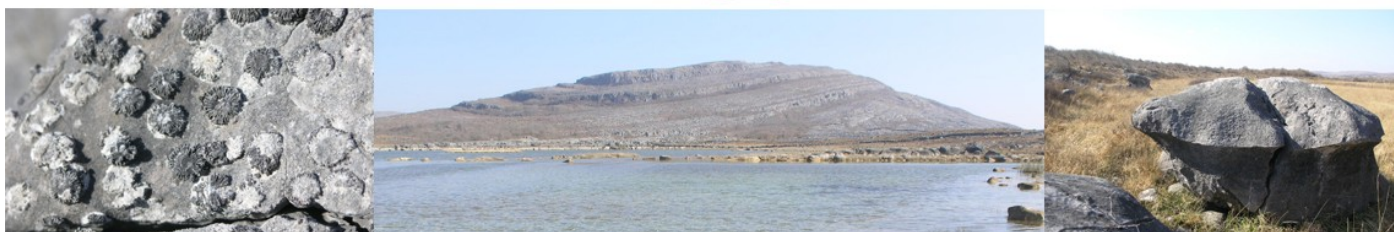
The Burren Rocks festival is nearly upon us. The festival forms part of the European Geoparks week and takes place from 25th to the 29th May.

Our Geology Evening School

The Geopark Geology evening course ran for the sixth time in February and March this year. The five week course was fully subscribed for yet another year. The course is run by Colin Bunce of the Burren Outdoor Education Centre and Geopark Geologist Eamon Doyle and provides an introduction to the geology of the Burren.

The course always features a guest speaker with Dr. Anthea Lacchia of UCD attending this year's course to share her knowledge on fossils found in the Geopark. The course attendees also ventured out into the landscape on a field trip to view the geological features.

Uisce Aille on Tour

The Students of Mary Immaculate Secondary School, Lisdoonvarna and their Uisce Aille project coordinator Grainne Barron of NUIG have been very busy showcasing their integrated catchment management project.

The GeoparkLIFE environmental education project aims to engage the wider community in the management of their local water with the secondary school students taking a lead role. The students defined and mapped their catchment identifying threats to its water quality. They then developed a programme to communicate to and engage with their wider community in its management.

NUIG masters Student Grainne Barron is also developing a toolkit from the process that will enable other secondary schools to run the programme. Grainne recently showcased the students work and her coordination of a toolkit at the IAH (International Association of Hydrogeologists) conference in Tullamore and to the European Geoparks Network in March this year.

The students will also be travelling to Dublin on the 23rd of May to showcase their project at the prestigious Young Environmentalist Awards finals.

Celebrating 25 Years of EU LIFE

EU LIFE is celebrating 25 years of funding and supporting environmental, nature conservation and climate action projects throughout the EU. Since 1992, EU LIFE has co-financed some 4500 projects including our ongoing GeoparkLIFE Tourism for conservation project.

With their investment of €8.7 billion since 1992 EU LIFE has created 74,500 jobs, bought a number of species back from the brink of extinction and funded actions on more than 7000 Natura 200 sites.

The Burren has benefited from two EU LIFE projects and as part of the promotion of the anniversary Carol Gleeson, GeoparkLIFE and Brendan Dunford, BurrenLIFE were interviewed on Clare FM.

To Celebrate the significant anniversary the EU Commission has organised a competition for the best projects in a range of categories. All nominated projects have been completed and supported in the last 25 years with Burren LIFE (now Burren Farming for Conservation) programme being one of 15 projects that have been chosen to represent the best of the best. Voting completed on the 3rd May and the awards ceremony will take place on 30 May, in Brussels. We wish all in the Burren LIFE project the very best of luck.

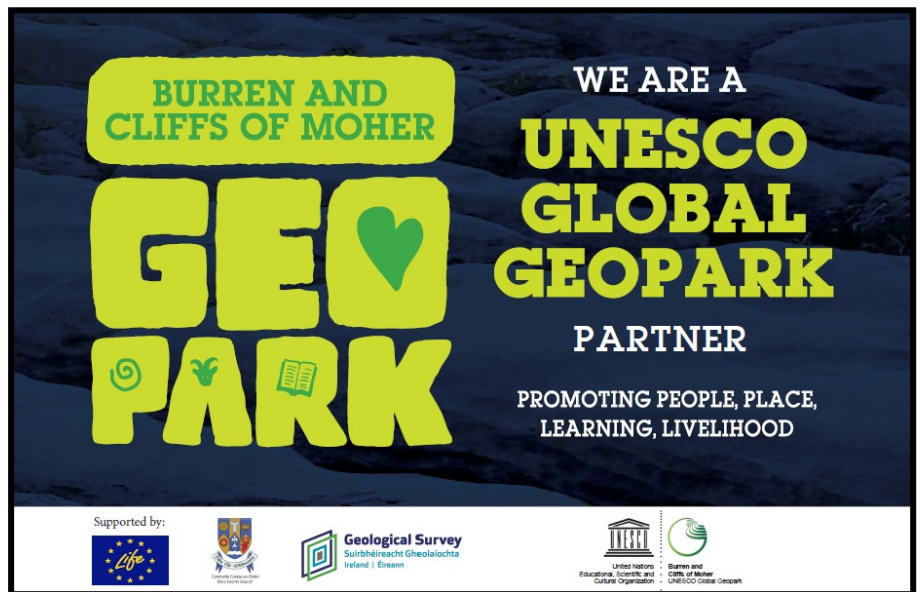
Partners in Sustainable Tourism

Hosts to the European Geoparks Network

Earlier this spring we hosted the managers and geologists from 68 of our fellow European UNESCO Global Geoparks for the annual European Geoparks Network meeting.

The international delegates spent five days here in our Geopark visiting many of our sites and local businesses to get a flavour of what the region has to offer. The group also held meetings and discussions on sustainable tourism. The Network has partnered with the UN International Year of Sustainable Tourism Development and the group discussed the significant role UNESCO Global Geoparks can play in sustainable tourism. The GeoparkLIFE project was presented as an example of sustainable tourism in a Geopark.

On the final day of the European Geoparks meeting the group went out and about. During the day long trip

they visited some of our Geosites including the Cliffs of Moher and Poul nabrone. They experienced a Cliffs of Moher cruise and a sheep dog demonstration at Caherconnell Stone Fort. The group stopped at Carron where they attended a talk on the Burren Farming for Conservation project by Dr. Brendan Dunford. They also stopped in Lisdoonvarna to hear about the Uisce Aille Hydrology project.

Thursday 25th May

11.30 -12.30: There's Life in the Old Rocks of Clare.

A talk in Ennistymon Public Library by Geopark Geologist Dr. Eamon Doyle about the fossils to be found in Clare. This event is in collaboration with the Bealtaine festival and Clare County Libraries.

Friday 26th May

A **4 hour - 20km** walk along the Burren Way from Corofin to the Burren National Park with Rural Recreation Officer Eoin Hogan. Return to Corofin using the Burren National Park bus from Gortlecka. **Meet:** At the National Parks Info Point, Corofin. **Bring:** Appropriate footwear essential. Water and snacks. Sunscreen. **Important!** Numbers are strictly limited to 25;
